Happy New Year! We survived our first hard freeze and didn't lose power or water! The winter has been a success so far.

A subcommittee of the board has started work on the General Manager Hiring Process to recommend the knowledge, skills, abilities,

and experience needed for the position and to recommend how and where to solicit qualified candidates. Once the process is approved, the community will be invited to participate in the hiring process.

The office has received a number of complaints about the noise, disruption, and damage of dirt bikes and other motorized vehicles on HOA property at the Community Center and near homes by the green belt. While not all the riders are Shady Hollow residents, we ask parents to remind their riders that the City of Austin prohibits dirt bikes in the green belt. The HOA will be posting signs with the same prohibition at the Community Center entrance to our Slaughter Creek property. If these vehicles are seen in the city green belt, residents can call the City of Austin at 311 to report the violation.

January Landscape Tips

Winter Garden Preparation!

Winter is the time to start preparing for spring and if you can't wait to get back to doing yard work, no need to wait any longer. This is an ideal time for many tasks that will help ensure success in your landscape in the upcoming season.

Irrigation

Automatic irrigation systems for homeowners can be shut off for the season as long as it continues to rain. Be sure to water about 10-15 minutes every couple of weeks if there is no significant rainfall. Plants and turf still require minimal water during the winter months. If you don't intend to utilize



your irrigation system, be sure to run it for 3-5 minutes once a month to keep it in working order and to check for leaks or breaks. Remember to water according to current water rules as set by your water supplier.

Trees

Winter is the best time of the year for pruning of Oak trees to prevent possible spread of Oak wilt. Remove deadwood, crossing branches, and raise canopies as needed. Use pruning paint on all cuts greater than 1" in diameter. Complete all tree pruning before the trees come out of dormancy.

Ornamental Beds

Cut back perennials to about 2"- 4" above the ground after the second hard freeze of the year. Removing dead wood from some perennials before the last freeze may remove the last line of defense the plant has from lasting frost damage. Cut back ornamental grasses to 10" - 12" above ground.

Fertilize ornamental beds with balanced slow release fertilizer. Look for a Nitrogen/Phosphorus/Potassium ratio of 1-1-1. Deadhead (Pinch blooms off) winter annuals such as Snapdragons, Pansies, Dianthus, and Cyclamen. Fertilize winter annuals with a high Phosphorus fertilizer to keep the bloom cycle going.

Minimize broadleaf weeds using weed controls or hand pull weeds such as Dandelion and Clover. Pre-emergent herbicides applied in February will be more effective if the turf areas are free of weeds. Please try to refrain from using "weed and feed" products as they have been known to have an adverse affect on trees. Begin cleaning up leaves and debris in shrub beds in preparation for February pre-emergent herbicide applications.

After shrub beds are free of weeds and debris, apply pre-emergent herbicide, in February, to minimize weed seed germination. Add enough new bark mulch to maintain a 2" - 3" depth in February or March. (Note: If your property has Live Oak Trees, you might wait until the trees have finished shedding their old leaves to avoid raking/blowing new mulch away).

Turf

For now make sure to keep the leaves and "winter" debris cleaned up. Do not allow your turf to suffocate under excessive amounts of leaves. This can cause dead areas in your turf. Start planning now for renovation of your lawn if it didn't survive the drought. You may want to consider more drought tolerant grasses and plants.

SH MUD Meeting Minutes Nov. 7, 2023(draft)

Date: November 7, 2023 6:30 pm

Persons present: Michael Tomme, President; Sam Harper, Vice President; Adam Hughes, Secretary; Russell Downey, Treasurer; and Kimberli Schiess, Assistant Secretary; William Swanks, District General Manager; and Zachariah T. Evans, District Attorney.

Citizen communication: none

Constable report:

Discussion of any necessary action regarding law enforcement matters: Chief Deputy Medrano updated the Board on the Constable's Office's operations within the District. The Constable's Office will be rotating deputies throughout the District in varying shifts. The Constable's Office is actively seeking to recruit new deputies, but finding candidates has been difficult.

Traffic enforcement signage and related matters: Mr. Evans reviewed Licensing Agreement and he did not see any provision that would be problematic for the District if the County were to allow the HOA to assign the Licensing Agreement to the District. The Board directed Mr. Evans to begin discussions with the HOA and the County about the District taking over the installation and eventual maintenance of the Speed Signs.

Directors' reports regarding general District business: Director Tomme reported that he spoke with the President of the Shady Hollow HOA about forming a joint committee to examine law enforcement services within the District. However, no committee has been formed to date and the HOA is unable to commit to cost sharing or providing other revenues for law enforcement services at this time. Director Tomme indicated it might be more productive for the Board to form a subcommittee of its own, with the Board appointing other interested citizens from within the District.

General Manager's Report: Mr. Swanks provided the General Manager's report, indicating that operations and finances were typical over the last month. He also reported that TUMCO identified and repaired a waterline leak at Doe Run and Shepherd. He said that TUMCO performed repairs on the Lost Oasis lift station, totaling approximately \$6,000.00.

Engineer's report on District facilities: none

Attorney's report: Mr. Evans asked if the Board could move monthly meetings to the third Wednesday of each month, beginning in January 2024. The Board said yes. Mr. Evans said he would include a corresponding agenda item for the Board's December meeting.

October 2023 Treasure's Report - Geoff Lawson

Bank accounts/Balance Sheet

- Our register balance in our Chase Bank operating account as of 9/30/23 was \$406,782.35. The balance was reconciled to the QuickBooks ledger by both me and the Heyman CPA firm.
- Our reserve accounts as of 9/30/2023 held \$143,370.83 in our Chase Reserve Account and \$218.801.39 in our CD at TDECU. Therefore, total reserve accounts for the period aggregate to \$362,172.22. We transferred \$9,308.00 from our operating account to our reserve account at Chase Bank in accordance with the funding plan detailed in our Jan 2021 reserve study.

Revenue

- On a Cash Basis presentation, total revenue for the month ending 9/30/2023 was \$17,301.74 versus budgeted revenue of \$54,918.75. This variance was largely the result of greater than expected assessment collections in previous months.
- Overall, net income for the month of September 2023 aggregated to -\$45,284.16 versus projected net income of -\$1,388.52.
- Transfer fee and resale certificate revenues continue to decline with the overall increase in interest rates (\$1,100 actual versus \$2,800 budgeted for the month).

Expenses

- Professional services expenses (category 60300) were under budget for the month (\$3,377.25 versus
- a budget of \$4,625.00) which relates to lower than projected legal expense (\$2,306.25 actual versus budget amount of \$4,000.00)
- Subscriptions (category 60510) was higher than projected (\$3,256.52 actual versus \$1,200.00 budgeted) since some subscriptions were prepaid.
- Repair and maintenance pool (category 70020). Total repairs and maintenance were (\$5,172.28 versus \$3,386.50 budgeted). This is result of higher than budgeted expenses for pool cleaning and chemicals.
- Lifeguard Salaries (category 70120) were higher than budgeted (\$7,930.78 versus budget of \$6,050.00) since we paid more per hour than was originally budgeted. We don't know what the City of Austin and other HOA's are going to be paying until long after the budget is finished.
- Capistrano Park other miscellaneous landscaping (category 81030) was (\$2,300.00 versus a budget of \$1,000.00). This relates to unplanned cutting and removal of trees and branches at the pool.

MRI Expenditures

• MRI expenses – There were no MRI expenses for the month of September.

- 1. Executive, Joan Allen Did not meet. Gave update regarding previous General Manager.
 - 1. Geoff Lawson, Mary Ellen Mathis, and Jim Bateman went to the court hearing for our previous General Manager. The attorney for the previous GM did not show up and the hearing has been moved to November 29th.
 - 2. The Stingray board signed a new contract with the HOA for the upcoming year.
- 2. Finance, Geoff Lawson Did not meet. Will meet next week.
- 3. Policy, Jim Bateman Did not meet
- 4. Community Center, Russell Downey Did not meet.
- 5. Parks and Recreation Jim Downing Did not meet, but wanted to report that there were very small puddles on the courts, and the deepest water was along the perimeter and not the court itself. The French drain worked, as it should.

- 8. Traffic, Carl Hooker Did not meet. Will meet next week.
